From the Principal's Desk

The front cover of our previous edition featured a photograph of the Minister for Education and Skills, Jan O'Sullivan TD, performing a sod turning event in respect of our new state of the art school building. It is most heartening to see builders on site as we go to print with this edition. MMD Construction commenced site works on the 10 million euro project on 3 November 2015. The main block of this construction, which runs parallel with the road, will be complete in January 2017, with the new gym and the extension of the e-block to be completed by September 2017. We look forward with great anticipation to these new facilities, which shall consolidate our reputation as a highly regarded educational establishment.

I want to congratulate our Leaving Certificate class of 2015 on their magnificent achievements in their examinations and wish them well in their third level studies. Their performances, and the results of our Junior Cert class of 2015, vastly outstripped the national average. As a school community, we are incredibly proud of all of our students who sat the State Examinations last June. It was wonderful to celebrate the achievements of our students at our Annual Awards evening in October in the company of our Guest of Honour, Ms Mary Kennedy. Ms Kennedy addressed our gathering about the importance of kindness and community and the need for every one of us to look out for each other. The sense of community and kindness that Mary Kennedy spoke of was so evident when all of our students and staff participated in our 'Caring for Ciara' sponsored walk which raised in excess of 30,000 euro. It is a wonderful testimony of our community. Ciara is a very strong, brave and resilient young lady with a bright future and we wish her and her family every blessing.

I was delighted to learn that a former Kinsale Community School student, Cian Gallagher, was awarded a UCC Quercus Scholarship at a formal reception at UCC on 1 December 2015. It is wonderful to learn that the achievements of past pupils of our school are so highly recognised.

In the course of this term our school hosted a number of distinguished guests which included the Spanish Ambassador, Mr José Maria Rodriguez-Coso. The Spanish students in our school add considerably to the vibrancy and culture of our community. It was a very special occasion to raise the Spanish flag with him while our music students, under the direction of Ms Brid Kearney, provided a recital.

We welcomed Senator Gerry Craughwell, who delivered an inspiring presentation to our Leaving Certificate students regarding achieving their target in life and the importance of healthy ambition.

We also welcomed Barnardo's CEO, Mr Fergus Finlay, who provided our Transition Year students with a fascinating presentation on equality and childhood poverty. Mr Finlay was visiting Kinsale as a guest of the Kinsale Peace Project, and as always, we are very grateful to Mr Pdraig Fitzgerald and his colleagues in the Kinsale Peace Project for including our school within their programme when such guests are in the locality.

We hosted a delegation from the Maltese Ministry for Education. The Maltese government is currently revising their teaching practices. To that end, they have liaised with UCC. Those that visited our school were exceptionally impressed and are anxious to maintain their liaison with us.

Our school show 'Billy the Musical' was a great success and I wish to acknowledge the artistic excellence of Mr Tony Cierans, the musical brilliance of Brid Kearney and the exceptional creativity of Kathleen Fitzpatrick in making the show such a success. support throughout the year. This ensures that we can provide direct help where it is most needed in the course of the school year. This, Rebel Og backed initiative is being piloted in our school and will benefit our students physical and social well being.

'LEADERS ON OUR LEVEL' CONFERENCE

On Monday 13th October, TY mini-company students and their teachers Ms O'Donovan and Ms Brosnan attended an enterprise conference hosted by West Cork Enterprise Board at the Inchydoney Hotel. It was a very busy event with over 300 TY students from all over West Cork attending! It was a very eye-opening and interesting event for the enterprise students who listened to a variety of speakers from various business backgrounds. It also provided students with an opportunity to learn about the steps in setting up a business, developing business ideas and also marketing plans.

Speakers included Kevin Buckley, CEO and Co-founder of Spearline Labs who opened the conference with a presentation on the steps involved in becoming an entrepreneur. He spoke about his own experiences of mini-company in secondary school, his studies, experience in industry and his own company which

now employs over 20 people locally in Skibbereen. He explained to students the importance of having vision, belief and strength for a business to succeed.

Young entrepreneur and Rosscarbery native, Peter Nagle then took to the stage to talk about his company Bitcove which he set up with his brother which acquires and sells Bitcoin. Peter spoke to students about his own experience of mini-company and the difficulties he experienced. He also advised students that it is vital to develop a product that sells to people and reiterated the importance of finding a niche for a market.

After a short break the next speaker Brid Ryan from Carrigaline spoke about her enterprise called QueenB Athletics. Brid spoke to students about her passion for sport and this was where the idea for her business started. She identified a niche in the area of comfortable yet fashionable sports kits for women. Brid focused her presentation on the importance of building a brand for a product and the variety of

methods that can be used to promote a product such as newspapers, sponsorship, competitions, websites and social media.

Finally the conference ended with a presentation from Niall O'Callaghan on motivation and goal setting. Niall spoke about his past experience as a Senior Executive Engineer with Cork County Council and his new business Pure Results Bootcamp. Students were very surprised and delighted to hear about his work with presenter Kathryn Thomas! Niall advised students about the importance of teamwork, motivation, dedication and innovation when working on a mini-company product.

Overall it was an interesting, enjoyable and educational experience for all the TY mini-company students who had plenty of questions to ask each speaker! Best of luck to all mini-company students in their mini-company projects!

ÉACHT NA SCOLAÍRÍ 2015

C E L E B R A T I N G S T U D E N T A C H I E V E M E N T

Kinsale Community School held its annual awards ceremony, Éacht na Scolairí, on Friday 16th October. Nearly 600 students, parents and staff packed into the school hall to honour the achievements of the Kinsale students in a variety of areas. Guests were treated to a variety of musical arrangements prepared by Ms Brid Kearney and her music students prior to commencement of the Awards Ceremony.

Guest of Honour for the night was broadcaster Ms Mary Kennedy who expressed her delight to be in attendance celebrating the success of students at Kinsale Community School. Ms Kennedy was impressed by the diversity of the awards being presented and stated that it was a good indicator of the entire community that is, Kinsale Community School. She commended the opportunities, celebrations and accolades being provided in the school and the success of the Leaving Certificate class of 2015 and in particular, the fact that 20% of students received over 500 points. She also expressed her delight at the number of students receiving Gaisce Awards (which is celebrating its 13th anniversary) and encouraged those who received a bronze Gaisce Award to work towards receiving a Silver. Ms Kennedy also stated that she got a very good sense of a holistic approach to education and that it was 'centre stage' at Kinsale Community School.

During her address, Ms Kennedy quoted Mahatma Gandhi in the statement 'Be the change that you want to see in the world'. She stated that the young people of Kinsale Community School had the energy, insight and the vision to make change happen. She also referred to many social issues now occurring in Irish society such as the issue of homelessness, mental health issues and bullying. She called on students to be conscious of the issue of bullying. She appealed to students to be on the lookout for people who may be going through a difficult time, to reach out to those who are vulnerable and also to reach out when they themselves are feeling vulnerable.

She also commended the Irish as a nation and how we show caring and in particular mentioned to the audience the good works



done by the Irish Naval Service providing support to migrants who were fleeing the troubles in their countries. Also she mentioned the Defence Forces who adopted two charities in their time off – a hospice for the dying and a children's charity for orphans of the civil war. She stated that this is what is in the DNA of Irish citizens and stated how the students of Kinsale were getting the opportunity to do good with the activities that are offered in the school. Ms Kennedy concluded her address by wishing the students well and encouraging students to continue their studies and to continue to achieve. She also wished the school well in their 20th Year Celebrations next year.

On the night, which was MCed by Deputy Principal Kathleen O'Brien, students received awards for a host of achievements and activities ranging from Year Awards to Sporting Awards to Academic Awards. Pupils from the Leaving Certificate class of 2015 were honoured for their outstanding results with the Senior Academic Award being presented to Eoghan Gilleran. The Junior Certificate Academic Award was presented to Fiona Deasy and Christopher Healy who were recognised for their excellent Junior Certificate results both receiving 10 A's and 1 B. Other notable awards on the night were the Sinéad Barry Memorial Award for Business which went to Alana McCarthy and Isabelle Lordan and the Catherine O'Byrne Memorial Award for German which was presented to Eoghan Gilleran and Maedhbh O'Leary. The Civic Virtue Award was presented to Fergal O'Brien. The Killian Ryan Memorial Award for the Arts was presented to Kayley Shine. The Joe McGrath Memorial Award was presented to Niamh Sheehan and the

Special Achievement in Sports Awards to Conor O'Callaghan (Table Tennis), Simon Kearney (Rowing) and Cathal Butler and Gary Ward (Golf). Finally, Life Science Consultants in Kinsale presented the Science and Technology Award to Gary O'Leary.

In welcoming Ms Mary Kennedy to the Kinsale Community School annual awards evening Fergal McCarthy, school principal extended his thanks to her for taking time out of her busy schedule to celebrate the success of the students at Kinsale Community School. Mr McCarthy also commented on how Kinsale had been nominated by Cork County Council to represent Cork in the Pride of Place Awards. He stated that he was thrilled with the fact that when Kinsale looked at what is great in our community and what defines our community, they singled out Kinsale Community School. Mr McCarthy also conveyed his congratulations to the Leaving Certificate class of 2015 who obtained exceptional results and also stated that their contribution to the school during their time there was truly remarkable.

sense of data, to have a spatial awareness, to understand patterns and sequences, and to recognise situations where mathematical reasoning can be applied to solve problems.

Similarly, literacy includes the capacity to read, understand and critically appreciate various forms of communication including spoken language, printed text, broadcast media, and digital media.

To ensure our students have the ability to fully engage with the modern world, KCS is committed to developing their language and logic skills. The Language and logic quiz is a popular and fun way of supporting the work our students carry out in the classroom and at home.

2 What is Bullying?


Behaviour which is

1. DELIBERATE
2. HURTFUL
3. REPEATED OVER TIME

If **all three aspects** are present together, whatever else the behaviour might be called **it is bullying** and must be dealt with as such.

If you see it don't support it!

RECOGNISE IT, REJECT IT, REPORT IT!



4 Psychological Impact of Bullying

- Feelings of insecurity, nervousness, being 'on edge,' less trustful.
- Damage to self-confidence, stops getting involved, becomes a loner.
- Lowering of self-esteem, unhappiness with oneself, more self-critical.
- Unexplained mood changes, mood swings, less relaxed and less happy.
- Behaviour changes, becoming suddenly aggressive or cranky.
- Stress/distress, inability to cope, lacking motivation, giving up.
- Extreme anxiety/panic attacks, getting away, opting out, 'mitching.'
- Nervous breakdown, inability to function normally even at home.
- Depression requiring psychiatric intervention, maybe hospitalisation.

Bullied students feel so hurt, humiliated and isolated that they find it hard to 'admit' they are being bullied!

This is usually why they need someone like you to report the bullying!

5 Things I could do if I am aware of a Bullying situation

1. Make sure I **do not join** in the bullying behavior.
2. Make sure I **do not show support** for the bullying by laughing along.
3. Make sure I **do not avoid** and so further isolate the targeted student.
4. Always **treat the targeted student with respect** even if I don't like her/him - I don't have to like everyone but I should still respect them.
5. With my friends present **remind the bullying student(s) about how harmful bullying is** - even when it seems to only involve 'little things.'
6. Suggest that the **bullying student(s) go and do something else**, maybe with me and my friends.
7. As soon as I get a chance, **report the bullying behaviour** so a teacher can investigate it and then, if it continues deal with it.

Bullying is usually secretive. It is hidden from teachers - or they are not there to see it repeated since they move from class to class.

You see it so the targeted student may need You to RECOGNISE IT, to REJECT IT because of the damage it can do . . . and then REPORT IT.

6 'REFORM NOT BLAME'

- Any students found to be involved in bullying will **not be punished** provided they **promise to stop the bullying** and keep that promise. (This '**Reform, not Blame**' approach is necessary so students will feel able to give **honest information**).
- Students **usually know if someone is treating others unfairly** but may be reluctant to report it, for various reasons, if perpetrators are likely to be punished.
- In the event that there has been bullying taking place, the student is asked to complete and sign a '**Student Behaviour Promise**' form and the relevant Year Head countersigns it.
- If the student **breaks this promise**, then a **second form must be signed** by the student and also signed by his/her parent/guardian.
- In the unlikely event that this fails, the **school's code of discipline** will be referred to.





Lourdres Pilgrimage 2015

What is Lourdes? Who is it for? Is it for young people? What is my role if I go? Do I go to mass all day everyday?

These are some questions that people may ask if they have not been to Lourdes before, to anyone who has been there will understand how Lourdes can have a positive effect on them and friendships and bonds that can be made from the trip. First of all without the young generation that we have today we would not be able to have this annual pilgrimage to Lourdes. To all youth who have journeyed to Lourdes, they will be able to tell you their own experiences and how they have seen a different side to people, making new friends, helping the elderly and overall enjoying their time out there. Two young ladies joined our pilgrimage this year from Kinsale Community School - Sarah McCarthy and Niamh Twomey. This article will help young and old to get an insight into Lourdes and what it's about.

Leave me give you a background into Lourdes. It is a city located in the south-western region of France. Lourdes has become a major place of Roman Catholic Pilgrimages each year. In 1858, The Virgin Mary appeared to Maire-Bernadette Soubirous on a total of eighteen occasions at the grotto of Lourdes. The first of these apparitions began on the 11th February 1858 when the Virgin Mary told Bernadette to dig in the ground at a certain spot and to drink from the small spring of water that began to bubble up. Today thousands of gallons of water gush from the source of the spring, and pilgrims are able to bathe in it. Countless miracle cures have been documented there, from healing of nervous disorders and cancers to cases of paralysis and even blindness.

Yearly from March to October the Sanctuary of Our Lady of Lourdes is a place of mass pilgrimage from Europe and other parts of the world. Each September, Carmelite Lourdes pilgrimage begins the journey to Lourdes on the 27th September until 2nd October. From my own personal experiences each year in Lourdes is a totally new experience. I am only 22 myself and I have been going to Lourdes since the age of 7 (15 years in a row), some people really find this hard to believe this but it's true! Each year for me is different to the previous one, from meeting new people to seeing old friends and assisting the elderly to helping out at ceremonies. Lourdes is a place of peace, tranquillity, being humble,



friendship, togetherness and seeing people for who they truly are. My sister Gemma and I, have been fortunate enough to attend Lourdes each year. This is due to the support of our relatives and parents Nora & Paul Eaton who are head of the Kinsale Carmelite Pilgrimage Group, alongside Fr. Stan Hession of the Friary Church in Kinsale. What better way to give a perspective than to get it from young members of our pilgrimage group and Kinsale Community School students Niamh Twomey (5th year) and Sarah McCarthy (5th year).

Niamh Twomey

"Looking back at my trip to Lourdes this year I can only recall fond memories and experiences. Prior to the pilgrimage I hadn't known what to expect and was slightly cautious heading out on the plane. I didn't know many of the pilgrims going besides the sole other youth helper Sarah. But I was welcomed with open arms into this tight knit community and got along great with everyone! I loved talking to the older generation and other pilgrims that we were accompanying. Seeing the happiness

on their faces over the simplest of things really made you reevaluate your priorities. As well as that, we met other youths from all over the country and were able to partake in many activities with them. A highlight for me was definitely the youth mass and the midnight prayer vigil.

In regards to the spiritual side of the trip, I came away with far more than expected. My faith was definitely rejuvenated after seeing all that Lourdes had to offer. It made me look on many aspects of my own life in new light and appreciate much of the little things I take for granted. Overall it was a pilgrimage I'll always remember and I would recommend it without hesitation to anyone interested."

Sarah McCarthy

"I went to Lourdes when I was 13 with my grandmother, mom and brother. I saw the youth helpers and thought it would be a great idea to come back as one when I was old enough. This year my friend Niamh Twomey and I decided to go on the pilgrimage as youth helpers. I knew what to expect since I was there before, but this year was even more magical as I got to make a difference helping with the sick. We didn't realise we'd make so many friends both young and old from all over Ireland! It was a great experience and very rewarding when we saw the smiles on the faces of the people we helped."

I have been travelling to Lourdes for the past 15 years and each year I have a different but always positive experience. Two years ago, I had the opportunity to carry the statute of Our Lady with my father Paul for the Torch Light Procession. This year I completed the High Stations which takes you up a steep incline around the Stations of the Cross. Here, I met two women who I helped all the way. It was a wonderful experience getting to know them and it is often the little things that can have a positive effect on a person. Even just a "hi, how's it going?" can brighten up anyone's day! It is a fantastic way to make friends with a great bunch of people both young and old. Year to year the faces might change but the friendships and bonds remain. I hope that this has helped you to get an insight into what really goes on in Lourdes and hope to see you in 2016 in our annual pilgrimage. God Bless.

In 2000, Honor again showed her adaptability and skill by moving into the very vital role of Home –School Liaison, showing her talents in developing and strengthening links between students, staff and parents. It was during this time in her career also that Honor co-ordinated supervised afterschool Study and took over a new role as Senior Year Head. She was always an extremely approachable and committed Year Head, getting to know each individual student



and supporting them at all times.

Always ready for a new challenge, Honor moved into the position of Chaplain in the school in 2007, a position for which she proved ideal. Her background in religion and music made her perfect when organising school masses, remembrance services, etc and all these occasions were very special times for the whole school community.

In her role as Chaplain, Honor was a very important member of the Pastoral Care team and her door was always open for any student who needed her. She cared for her students and their welfare was always central to her work and she was an invaluable support to the Guidance Counsellors and to School Management always.

Honor was truly involved in every part of school life including extra curricular, going on 2 school tours and helping out

in every school event.

She never lost her love for music and was musical director for the school show "Oliver" and helping out backstage in many other musicals throughout the years. She even took to the stage herself on one occasion, playing the part of an interviewee for a job as a nanny. She lost out that time to 'practically perfect' Mary Poppins but proved perfect herself when

she interviewed for the job of Deputy Principal in Coláiste Muire and was successful.

We know that she will be excellent in this new role as she has been in all other roles she has filled. She will make it her own and she will bring her expertise and efficiency, her skills and talents, her caring and personal touch to this position too. Kinsale's loss is definitely Crosshaven's gain.


Her calm and nurturing presence is missed in Kinsale by the whole school community but we wish her every success and happiness in her new situation.
